Change of Investment Manager

On 9th May 2024, the Board of The North American Income Trust plc (the "Company") announced that the Company had agreed heads of terms to appoint Janus Henderson Fund Management UK Limited as its new AIFM and Investment Manager. The appointment is effective from 1st August 2024.

Investment objective

To provide investors with above average dividend income and long term capital growth through active management of a portfolio consisting predominantly of S&P 500 US equities.

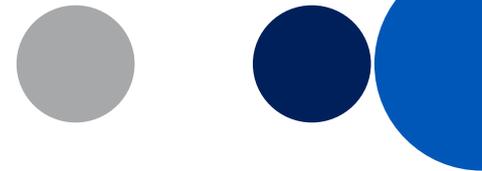

Fund managers' report

The Trust generated a net asset value total return ahead of the benchmark Russell 1000 Value Index's total return in sterling terms. The share price total return also outperformed the index in the month.

The Russell 1000 Value Index ended lower in June. The domestic economy, particularly the labour market, has continued to prove resilient and robust despite slowing. Consequently, annual consumer price inflation was higher than expected over the first three months of this year before meeting expectations in April, although it came in lower than forecast in May. Meanwhile, heightened tensions in the Middle East have brought additional inflationary risks due to the potential effect on crude supplies and shipping costs. At its June meeting, the US Federal Reserve (Fed) kept the target range for its fed funds rate at a 23-year high of 5.25-5.50%, marking the seventh consecutive time it has left rates unchanged. The latest 'dot plot' from the Fed's committee members forecast just one rate cut in 2024 – whereas three had been predicted back in March – with further easing likely in 2025 and 2026. However, after steadily falling over the course of last year, the Fed's targeted inflation measure – the annual core Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) Price Index – has only slightly declined in the first five months of 2024. Against this backdrop, Fed Chair Jerome Powell reiterated at the June meeting that the central bank requires more evidence of core PCE inflation sustainably moving towards the 2% target before considering policy easing. Therefore, the Fed aims to maintain a restrictive policy stance, proceeding cautiously with a data-dependent approach as it seeks greater clarity on underlying economic trends. As a result, investors now anticipate only one or two rate cuts in 2024, starting in the autumn at the earliest. Previously, investors had been factoring in as many as six or seven cuts from June onwards. Moreover, some Fed officials are in favour of further tightening to keep stubborn inflation at bay. However, Fed Chair Jerome Powell has stated that the central bank's next move is unlikely to be a rate hike, which has reassured investors somewhat.

In terms of economic data, according to the final estimate, the US economy expanded at an annualised rate of 1.4% in the first quarter of 2024. This marked



a decrease from the 3.4% growth rate reported in the final quarter of 2023. Meanwhile, annual consumer price inflation fell from 3.4% in April to a lower-than-expected 3.3% in May. The annual core rate, which excludes volatile food and energy prices, eased from 3.6% to 3.4%, also below expectations. Over the same period, the Fed's preferred measure of inflation – the core Personal Consumption Expenditures Price Index – fell from an annual rate of 2.8% to 2.6%, as expected, but remained above the Fed's 2% target. According to a preliminary estimate, the S&P Global Composite US Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) edged up from 54.5 in May to 54.6 in June, which was above expectations (with a reading above 50 indicative of an expansion in business activity). Within that, the manufacturing PMI rose from 51.3 to a higher-than-expected 51.7, while the services PMI increased from 54.8 to a better-than-expected 55.1. Following the Fed's monetary tightening campaign, the US labour market has remained robust. In particular, the US economy added 272,000 non-farm jobs in May, which was well above expectations and up from a downwardly revised 165,000 jobs in April. Moreover, annual average earnings growth increased from an upwardly revised 4.0% in April to a higher-than-expected 4.1% in May. However, the unemployment rate unexpectedly increased from 3.9% to 4.0% over the same period. Additionally, retail sales edged up by a lower-than-expected 0.1% month on month in May after a downwardly revised decrease of 0.2% in April, as consumer spending remained subdued. Furthermore, the University of Michigan's consumer confidence barometer fell from 69.1 in May to a lower-than-expected 68.2 in June. The main drivers of the decline were rising inflation expectations and increased economic uncertainty due to the forthcoming election. Lastly, given the decline in longer-dated US Treasury yields that occurred in June, the average rate for a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage decreased to around 6.9% over the month but remained elevated by historical standards.

In portfolio-related corporate news, investor enthusiasm for generative artificial intelligence (GenAI) drove the shares of semiconductor and software vendor Broadcom higher. The company reported strong quarterly results and increased its full-year guidance as customers demanded more AI-related chips. Oracle Corporation, an enterprise software developer and cloud service provider, reported robust bookings for its Oracle Cloud Infrastructure cloud offering, driven in large part by GenAI, and announced new partnerships with Google and OpenAI.

UnitedHealth Group was the only Trust holding with a notable dividend increase in June. The company increased its quarterly dividend by 11.7% to a current yield of 1.6%, building upon its established track record of dividend growth.

There was no portfolio activity during the month.

Outlook

US economic growth has been resilient, but the pace has moderated as a result of slower consumer spending and subdued investments driven by higher interest rates. In line with this, inflation has also slowed in recent months, which we expect to continue with ongoing easing in the labour market, wage growth, and housing inflation. Despite these signs of cooling inflation, the Fed remains cautious in its approach to cutting rates, signalling only one cut for this year.

Effective 1 August 2024, the management of the company will move to Janus Henderson Investors.
